Mission

To ensure awakening and awareness of the students by providing quality education and help them prepare for the future beyond the campus by nurturing and inculcating ability to face new challenges.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Although the College does not have any Management Information System, all other administration and student related data are maintained through dedicated software namely

- AIMES student management software.
- Easy Pay pay roll software.
- Accounting software COREL (ACE)

All necessary information is uploaded at college website for students' knowledge.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Academic calendar is prepared based on the guidelines laid down by the University of Calcutta, which is subject to changes due to unavoidable circumstances.
- Teachers submit yearly teaching plan in an attempt to complete the syllabi on time.
- Teachers' diary is regularly maintained by all the teachers.
- Exchange of inter-departmental faculty for students' benefit.
- Remedial/tutorial classes are arranged for students' assistance.
- Field work/ excursion/ visit to industry and laboratory for students are organized for their academic development and providing them with the first hand experience.
- Students' seminar and other academic activities are being arranged by different departments.
- Screening of films and enacting dramas for the students of Film studies and English departments.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Teaching plan made by the teachers is followed.
- Regular class tests and other educational assignments are conducted apart from mid-term and selection examinations.
- Parent-teachers meeting are held to discuss the performances of the students.
- Question banks are provided to the students and are solved by the concerned subject teacher in the classes.
- Scrapbooks, model presentation, wall magazine, seminars based on their curriculum are arranged for students by the departmental teachers.
- Resource persons are invited for delivering lectures to develop interest among the students in the respective subject.
- Lab journals published by the Dept. of Journalism & Mass Communication are entirely edited by students.
- Students are encouraged to participate in intra and inter college quiz, group discussion, debate competitions, poster presentation etc.

For three years (1+1+1 Regulations) B.A./B.Sc/B.Com (H&G) courses, the college follows the Calcutta University guidelines.

- The college conducts its internal examinations for proper assessment and prepares the students for the University examinations. The internal assessment and evaluation includes class tests, mid-term and selection examination.
- The students are shown their answer scripts, and grievances, if any, are redressed.
- The students securing poor marks are given additional guidance through remedial classes, so that they can secure higher marks in the University examinations.

For newly introduced **Semester-wise B.Com (H&G) Examination (under CBCS)** from the 2017-18 session; the college follows the Calcutta University guidelines:

- Attendance of students is maintained and internal assessment marks are submitted to University. Practical, theoretical and tutorial examinations are held as per schedule.
- Students are guided with the curriculum and are directed towards the new regulations.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The college has an existing research committee which motivates teacher to get enrolled for Ph.D./ M. Phil. programmes.
- The management has provided seed money to initiate research project.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Library

- The library is fully computerized with the integrated open source library management software KOHA and OPAC (In house).
- Books in central and departmental library are available for students and faculty members.
- Access to e-books and e-journals through INFLIBNET/ IUC facilities.
- The Institute has subscribed to the British Council Library membership for students and faculty members.

ICT

- Two separate audio- visual rooms have been set up for conducting interactive classes.
- Internet access to students and teachers both in the library and some of the departments is provided.

Physical infrastructure / Instrumentation

- Spacious, airy class rooms for conducting theory classes.
- Well- equipped laboratories for practical classes.
- Computers, laptops, cameras for filming, stereoscope, dumply level, GPS, spectrophotometer, laminar air-flow, BOD incubator etc. and every instrument required for curriculum are available.
- 32 CCTV cameras are present in various locations within the campus.
- Power back-up by 63 KVA diesel generator.
- College bus for dropping students and staffs to nearby bus stops and subway stations.
- Wi-fi access at Admin block, Library, and in all the departments.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Efficient deployment of human resources has always been the main concern of the College.
- Faculty members are involved in both academic and college committee work. The various responsibilities are coordinated with academic activities.
- Two teachers, one student and one non –teaching staff have been absorbed as the members of the Governing Body.
- Student members have been kept in several college committees (magazine, cultural, sports, and internal complaint cell) to assist the teachers.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The following steps are followed for faculty recruitment:

- i. An advertisement is given at daily newspaper before recruitment.
- ii. Screenings of applicants is done based on merit and experience and are called for interviews.
- iii. A selection committee is formed comprising of University expert, GB member, Principal and departmental head.
- iv. Faculties are appointed based on the panel.

Regarding staff recruitment the Management and the Principal take decision based on their merit and experience.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- In the 2017-18 academic session, the college organised a placement drive by TCS-BPS and seven (7) students were recruited. More such initiative has to be enhanced by the college.
- Students from few departments are taken for industry visit for developing enthusiasm and knowledge in the commercial world.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

An Admission committee comprising the Principal and heads of departments ensures that candidates seeking admission are appropriately informed on various aspects through the distribution of prospectus, pamphlets, website etc. Admission is done on merit basis, following the University of Calcutta guidelines for every subject.

Annexure 2: Action taken by IQAC on the basis of feedback from stakeholders

- 1. Notices are regularly uploaded in the official website of the college.
- 2. SMS regarding student related matters is sent to both students and parents from time to time.
- 3. Regarding co-curricular activities, students are encouraged and allowed to participate in different inter-college competitions as well as intra college ones, be it cultural or educational.
- 4. Infrastructure has been developed by the institution for outdoor games like basketball, cricket etc.
- 5. Students are provided with campus recruitment facility where companies like TCS-BPS and ICICI have visited the college campus and appointed many of them.
- 6. The numbers of ICT classes have increased as teachers are motivated to conduct more of them and purchase of more projector and laptops have been undertaken.
- 7. More computers have been purchased so that more students can get access for their use.
- 8. A lady sweeper has been appointed for regular cleaning of girl's toilet.

Annexure 3:

The NSS Program Officer and members of NSS advisory committee have worked whole heartedly as one team all through the year. They have periodically organized several events and maintained the cleanliness of the college campus and neighbourhood.

The major extension activities and Institutional social responsibility done through College NSS team

- 1. Celebration of Independence Day at College campus (15th Aug, 2017): Celebration of '71st Independence Day' at College campus. The NSS volunteers decorated the campus with the Tri-color National Flags and painted floral designs with Rangoli. The Principal, advisory committee members, office and non-teaching staff helped in the celebration of the special day and there was a dynamic touch of enthusiastic participation.
- 2.NSS membership drive (17th and 18th Aug, 2017): NSS volunteers interacted with the 1st yr students of various departments and motivated them to join NSS, through which they can serve the humanity. Many fresher's nominated their names and readily agreed to join NSS.
- 3. Celebration of Saraswati Pujo (20th and 22nd Jan, 2018): The NSS volunteers along with other College students celebrated Sarawati Puja. On 20th Jan, they spend the whole day in decorating the Saraswati Idol and puja ambiances with colourful ribbons and rangoli. On 22nd Jan, they were present for the entire puja ceremony and helped in distribution of fruits and sweets. They further performed few cultural programs.
- 4. Campus cleaning (30th Jan, 2018): The NSS volunteers cleaned the campus with a lot of care. They were given several broomsticks and dustbins. All the garbage was being disposed properly and at the end bleaching powder was sprayed to kill the mosquito larvae. This was an initiative as an extension of Swachh-Bharat movement.
- 5. Cleaning of College Medicinal plant garden (12th Feb, 2018): The NSS volunteers cleaned the medicinal plant garden and gave water to the plants.
- 6.An Awareness programme on Child Nutrition at College campus (27th Feb, 2018): NSS unit organized a Lecture & Demonstration Session on child nutrition for infant and pre-school kids. The children of NEEV school (a free school for underprivileged children) and their parents were invited for the session. The theme kept was 'Shishu ka Shahi Poshon: Desh or Jati ka hi Abhution'. The program was arranged in collaboration with Food & Nutrition (FNTA) Department. On 26th Feb, the FNTA students worked hard to prepare the poustic laddoos and other foods. On 27th Feb, the teacher and students of FNTA department gave power-point presentations on healthy & delicious food to the parents of NEEV kids. They explained how the kids will happily eat healthy foods like palak paratha, basanchilla, egg roll, poustic laddoo etc. and at the same time will get sufficient nutrition. One packet of poustic laddu was distributed among 80 children of NEEV. The program was really appreciated by the parents of NEEV children. For both the days, the NSS volunteers actively participated to successfully complete the programme.

- 7.An Awareness programme on AIDS at College campus (28th Feb, 2018): An awareness programme on AIDS was organized and the chief Guest was Dr. Subrata Sarkar (Retd. Principal, College of Nursing, R.G. Kar Medical College & Hospital). She has been working with HIV positive patients for many years and shared her experience with the NSS volunteers and other students of the college. Three HIV positive patients were also present and it was really heart-touching to hear their stories and the ill-behaviour they receive from the society.
 - The NSS volunteers arranged a poster competition on AIDS Awareness. The participants presented several posters and slogans, which were being judged by our chief guest. Dr. Subrata Sarkar. The winners were given certificates and prizes.
- 8. Book distribution for NEEV children (19th March, 2018): Story-books, crayons, pencils and erasers were distributed amongst the NEEV kids by the NSS volunteers.
- 9. Awareness programme on Malaria and Dengue (26th March, 2018): The NSS volunteers did a door-to door campaign at the adopted slum Jyoti Nagar Colony to spread awareness on malaria and dengue. They distributed pamphlets to the residents and explained the necessity to maintain hygiene. They also requested them to make sure that they should not store water for long as it becomes breeding ground for mosquito.
- 10. For the 7-Day Special Camp (8th March to 14th March, 2018), the following activities were organized:
- i. Day 1: 8th March 2018: The Inaugural day A Lecture on Environmental Issues.
 - Dr. Mausumi Singh Sengupta (Principal), Chief Guest Mr. Rajarshi Chakrabarty (Senior Project Officer; WWF India, Western Arunachal Landscape Programme) and OC of Chitpore Police Station inaugurated the 7-Day Special camp programme by lighting the lamp. All the guests were felicitated by the respected Principal Madam after which she delivered a short speech on the various activities to be held in the special camp 2017-18. The OC of Chitpore police station gave a short motivational speech for the volunteers. This was followed by an audio-visual lecture by our chief guest Mr. Chakrabarty on 'Environmental Issues Endangered Wild Life of India –Under Conservation'.
- ii. Day 2: 9th March 2018: Personality Development programme.
 - A personality development programme was arranged for NSS Volunteers and other college students. The chief guest for the day was Col. Probir Sengupta (Indian Army). An extraordinary interactive session was conducted by him on career counselling & personality development and was really appreciated by the students. He discussed on several issues which is currently paralysing the society and the present generation. He specially requested the male students to show respect to women and always stand against any immoral activity.
- iii. Day 3: 10th March 2018: An Awareness programme on Health Issues & Health Check- up for NEEV Children and NSS volunteers.
 - A Health Awareness programme was organized for the NEEV Children and NSS volunteers in collaboration with Food & Nutrition Department. The height and weight of 35 NEEV kids were measured and the data was compared to their respective age, to find out whether they were having

proper growth with their growing age. The facts were shared with their parents. The children were given some refreshments at the end.

As a measure of health check-up; blood group, blood sugar and pressure were estimated of the 50 NSS volunteers.

iv. Day 4: 11th March 2018: Poster Competition on Road Safety.

The NSS volunteers prepared posters for the 'Poster competition' on road safety. The posters were being judged by few NSS advisory members and other teachers. The posters were appreciated and were viewed by teachers and other college students. The winners were given certificates.

v. Day 5: 12th March2018: Road Safety Training:

A Road Safety Training was organized by our NSS unit. The invited speaker was from Shyambazar Traffic Guard & Traffic Training School, Tala. He delivered lecture on road safety and several video footages were shown, taken from CCTV cameras installed at different locations in the city. The videos clearly shows that majority of the accidents could have been avoided and using these footages he explained with care why safety measure is very much needed during driving and while crossing streets.

Best Practice 1:

Title: Basketball training programme for students

Goal: To encourage participation in sports activities and games among the students, a basketball training programme has been started so that students can get the opportunity to compete at the University and National levels. As more number of female students has enrolled their names, the focus has been on training and moulding them into outstanding sportswomen.

Context: The College makes a conscious effort to encourage both indoor games and outdoor sports among students. To create an environment conducive to sports, the Management has constructed rooms for playing carom and table tennis, a cricket field as well as a basketball court. Such co-curricular activities and games are equally important for the physical and mental development of the students along with academics.

The Practice:

- a. A basketball court has been set up within the eco-friendly green campus.
- b. A professional trainer has been appointed to coach interested students.
- c. Students get a rigorous coaching thrice a week with each session lasting for three hours.
- d. The students have become confident and are now regularly encouraged to participate in and play at various events and competitions.

Evidence of success:

- 1. Many students from various departments have enrolled their names and they actively participate in the training programme.
- 2. Some female students from the college have been selected for Calcutta University's women's basketball team.

Best Practice 2:

Title: Introduction of Food and Nutrition course at the UG level: A Professional course for the benefit of the students

Goal: To provide an opportunity to students to gain hands-on experience in food science and to make them ready for employment. The course provides in-depth knowledge about nutrition, biochemistry, microbiology, physiology and a lot more.

Context: A balanced and healthy diet reduces the risk of diseases like obesity, diabetes, heart disease, liver disorder and some kinds of cancer. After graduating, the students can gain employment as nutritionists, dieticians, therapists, food safety consultants, etc. A state-of-the-art laboratory has been

set-up by the Management to ensure that the best equipment is available for effective practical training of the students.

The Practice:

- a. The course has been much in demand since its introduction in the College. The fact that all the seats got filled-up in the very first year gives evidence of the positive response that the course has received from the students.
- b. The teachers are very enthusiastic and motivate the students to attend classes regularly.
- c. The Departmental teachers and students in collaboration with the College NSS unit have organized several programs like health check-ups for college students and awareness programmes on child nutrition for NEEV kids (see annexure 3). The parents of NEEV kids were asked to participate in a lecture session on 'Shishu ka Shahi Poshon: Desh or Jati ka hi Abhution' which increased their awareness regarding nutrition and healthy eating habits.

Evidence of success:

- 1. Students of the Department of Food and Nutrition participated in the Inter-College Competition held at Calcutta University during the National Nutrition Week. They highlighted 'The importance and significance of exclusive Breast Feeding during first six months of infancy'. Due to their outstanding presentation, the students secured the second position.
- 2. Teachers and students have worked on spreading awareness about healthy diet for children among the less-privileged families of the neighbourhood.
- 3. Students also organized a healthy food carnival for the college teachers and students recently.
- 4. Students have actively participated in the Youth Parliamentary competition at Behala College.
